4) Jesus Cries out to the Father

Matthew 27: 46/Mark 15: 34

And about the ninth hour, Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, "Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani?" that is, "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?"

In the darkest hours of his suffering, Jesus cried out the opening words of Psalm 22.

And although much has been suggested regarding the meaning of this phrase, it is quite apparent the agony Christ felt as he expressed separation from God.

Here we see the Father turning away from the Son as Jesus bore the full weight of our sin.

6) It is Finished

John 19: 30 ...He said, "It is finished!"

Jesus knew he was suffering the crucifixion for a purpose. Earlier he had said in John of his life, "No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have authority to lay it down and authority to take it up again. This command I received from my Father." These three words were packed with meaning, for what was finished here was not only Christ's earthly life, not only his suffering and dying, not only the payment for sin and the redemption of the world—but the very reason and purpose He came to earth was finished. His final act of obedience was complete. The Scripture had been fulfilled.
